

Maryland HBCU Lawsuit

Aspiring Educator:

- Attended informational sessions at Morgan State University about the MD HBCU Lawsuit and signed on to advocate
- Shared the information I learned with the aspiring educators on Coppins Campus
- Attended Coppin town halls and SGA meetings to share the issue of the lawsuit and how we can engage to fight for our HBCU.
- Organized on Coppin's campus for the lawsuit and connected it to the Blueprint fight educators on campuses were already advocating for
- Met with the Divine 9 and other campus organizations to inform them and move them to action
- Bussed students to neighboring HBCU Morgan State University to join their march and informational session
- Hosted voting registration on campus and advertised names/photos of the elected officials who supported the lawsuit and were up for re-election

Early Career Educator:

- Discussed with local union the issue of the HBCU lawsuit and how it directly impacts educators in our county
- Hosted town hall events at PGCEA and educated union and community members on the lawsuit
- Wrote and sent over 1,000 letters to the Governor and legislators
- Continued organizing with aspiring educators at Bowie State & Coppin Univ. by hosting teach-ins on the Blueprint and the HBCU lawsuit
- Signed on 23 partners - **key partnerships** were the Legislative Black Caucus, Color of Change, NAACP, Maryland Democratic Party, Maryland Black Republican Party, and the Maryland State Education Association
- Hosted a Rally in Annapolis with the Speaker of the House Adrienne Jones, members of the Maryland Legislative Black Caucus led by Delegate Darryl Barnes, State's Attorney Aisha Braveboy, Coalition Counsel Mike Jones, and Maryland HBCU Alumni addressed the crowd
- Hosted a series of town hall events across the state of Maryland and called people to actions by making phone calls, sending emails or hand writing letters.
